

Our History

The **Manchester Reform Synagogue**, affectionately referred to as **Jackson's Row**, has a rich history that traces back to the early 19th century, when Jewish communities in Manchester sought to establish a new religious movement that would balance tradition with modernity. Also known as **Sha'ar Zion** (The gates of Zion) our community's connection to Israel and its' communities is deep and long lasting.

Early Days and Growing Influence



Established in **1857**, the community quickly found its footing. In **1858**, the synagogue established its first building on **Park Place** in Cheetham Hill, a neighborhood that was home to many of Manchester's Jewish residents at the time and was a major step in cementing the Reform presence in the city.

The 20th Century: Expansion and Resilience

By the 20th century, the **Manchester Reform Synagogue** had established itself as a central institution for Jews in Manchester, particularly those who were interested in a more flexible form of Jewish observance. The congregation grew significantly during this period, especially after **World War II** when many Jews sought religious communities that would help them reconcile their traditions with a rapidly changing world.

In the **1930s** and **1940s**, the synagogue became a place of refuge for Jewish refugees fleeing persecution in Europe. The congregation played a key role in helping these new arrivals adjust to life in the UK.

The building was bombed during the blitz in **1941**, meaning a new home had to be found for the growing congregation. In **1949** that home became **Jackson's Row,** where the synagogue remained until **2022**.






Throughout the **20th century**, the synagogue modernized its services and approach. It adapted to the needs of its members, embracing changes like the introduction of mixed-gender seating, greater participation of women in services, and the celebration of significant milestones in members' lives through a variety of rituals and celebrations.

Greater Manchester Reform Community

In the 1970's a growing community outside the now much larger city center led to the founding of the daughter Reform congregations; **Menorah** in South Manchester shortly followed by **Sha'arei Shalom** in North Manchester.

The three, now sister congregations, have remained closely linked to ensure support and community for all our members wherever they are.

Development and The Future.

With a need to modernize the synagogue building as well as the city center itself, the site on Jackson's Row was sold for development to ex-Manchester United football player Gary Neville for £15m.
